STOP


Dear Devotees.

observed throughout India, as well as by devoted Hindus in all parts of the world. Clay figures of the Deity are made and after being worshipped are

He is the Lord of power and wisdom. He is the eldest son of Lord Shiva and the elder brother of Skanda or Kartikeya. He is the energy of Lord Shiva and so He is called the son of Shankar and Umadevi. By worshipping Lord Ganesha mothers hope to earn for their sons the sterling virtues of Ganesha. The story of his birth and how He came to have the head of an elephant:

Once upon a time, the Goddess Gauri (consort of Lord Shiva), while bathing, created Ganesha as a pure white being out of the mud of Her Body and placed Him at the entrance of the house. She told Him not to allow anyone to enter while she went inside for a bath. Lord Shiva Himself was returning home quite thirsty and was stopped by Ganesha at the gate. Shiva became angry and cut off Ganesha's head as He thought Ganesha was an outsider. When Gauri came to know of this she was sorely grieved. To console her grief, Shiva ordered His servants to cut off and bring to Him the head of any creature that might be sleeping with its head facing north. The servants went on their mission and found only an elephant in that position. The sacrifice was thus made and the elephant's head was brought before Shiva. The Lord then joined the elephant's head onto the body of Ganesha.

Lord Shiva made His son worthy of worship at the beginning of all undertakings, marriages, expeditions, studies, etc. He ordained that the annual worship of Ganesha should take place on the 4th day of the bright half of Bhadrapada.

The following are some of the common Names of Lord Ganesha: Dhoomraketu, Sumukha, Ekadantha, Gajakarnaka, Lambodara, Vignaraja, Ganadhyaksha, Phalachandra, Gajanana, Vinayaka, Vakratunda, Siddhivinayaka, Surpakarna, Heramba, Skandapurvaja, Kapila and Vigneshwara. He is also known by many as Maha-Ganapathi.

Devotees do Japa of Ganesha Gayatri Mantra: Tat purushaaya vidmahe; Vakratundaaya dheemahi; Tanno dhanti prachodayaat.

Lord Ganesha is an embodiment of wisdom and bliss. He is the Lord of Brahmacharins. He is foremost amongst the celibates.

He has as his vehicle a small mouse. He is the presiding Deity of the Muladhara Chakra, the psychic centre in the body in which the Kundalini Shakti resides.

He is the Lord who removes all obstacles on the path of the spiritual aspirant, and bestows upon him worldly as well as spiritual success. Hence He is called Vigna Vinayaka. His Bija Akshara (root syllable) is *Gung*, pronounced to rhyme with the English word "sung". He is the Lord of harmony and peace.

Lord Ganesha represents Om or the Pranava, which is the chief Mantra among the Hindus. Nothing can be done without uttering it. This explains the practice of invoking Ganesha before beginning any rite or undertaking any project. His two feet represent the power of knowledge and the power of action. The elephant head is significant in that it is the only figure in nature that has the form of the symbol for Om.

The significance of riding on a mouse is the complete conquest over egoism. The holding of the *ankusha* represents His rulership of the world. It is the emblem of divine Royalty.

Ganesha is the first God. Riding on a mouse, one of nature's smallest creatures and having the head of an elephant, the biggest of all animals, denotes that Ganesha is the creator of all creatures. Elephants are very wise animals; this indicates that Lord Ganesha is an embodiment of wisdom. It also denotes the process of evolution—the mouse gradually evolves into an elephant and finally becomes a man. This is why Ganesha has a human body, an elephant's head and a mouse as His vehicle. This is the symbolic philosophy of His form.

He is the Lord of Ganas or groups, for instance groups of elements, groups of senses, etc. He is the head of the followers of Shiva or the celestial servants of Lord Shiva. Lord Ganesha's two powers are the Kundalini and the Vallabha or power of love.

He is very fond of modak or balls of rice flour with a sweet core. On one of His birthdays, having eaten a good number of modaks, He set out moving on His mouse at night. Suddenly the mouse stumbled—it had seen a snake and became frightened—with the result that Ganesha fell down. His stomach burst open and all the sweet puddings came out. But Ganesha stuffed them back into His stomach and, catching hold of the snake, tied it around His belly.

Seeing all this, the moon in the sky had a hearty laugh. This unseemly behaviour of the moon annoyed Him immensely and so he pulled out one of His tusks and hurled it against the moon, and cursed that no one should look at the moon on the Ganesh Chaturthi day. If anyone does, he will surely earn a bad name, censure or ill-repute. However, if by mistake someone does happen to look at the moon on this day, then the only way he can be freed from the curse is by repeating or listening to the story of how Lord Krishna cleared His character regarding the Syamantaka jewel. This story is quoted in the *Srimad Bhagavatam*. This really means avoid the company of all those who have no faith in God,.

Ganesha and His brother Lord Subramanya once had a dispute as to who was the elder of the two. The matter was referred to Lord Shiva for final decision. Shiva decided that whoever would make a tour of the whole world and come back first to the starting point had the right to be the elder. Subramanya flew off at once on his vehicle, the peacock, to make a circuit of the world. But the wise Ganesha went, in loving worshipfulness, around His divine parents and asked for the prize of His victory. Saying "My parents represent the entire manifested universe!" Thus the dispute was settled in favour of Lord Ganesha, who was thereafter acknowledged as the elder of the two brothers.

Ganesh Chaturthi day, meditate on Lord Ganesha early in the morning, during the Brahmamuhurta period. Then, after taking a bath, go to the temple and do the prayers of Lord Ganesha. Offer Him some coconut and sweet pudding. Pray with faith and devotion that He may remove all the obstacles that you experience on the spiritual path. Take fresh spiritual resolves and pray to Lord Ganesha for inner spiritual strength to attain success in all your undertakings.

HINDUISM AND TOLERANCE



S. S. Rama Rao Pappu . Professor of Philosophy & Comparative Religion, Miami University, Oxford, OH.

"I am proud to belong to a religion which has taught the world both tolerance and universal acceptance. We believe not only in universal tolerance, but we accept all religions as true. As different streams having different sources all mingle their waters in the sea, so different paths which men take through different tendencies various though they appear; crooked or straight, all lead to God."

-- Swami Vivekananda

"(The Hindus) by their extreme tolerance of other belies and other ways than their own...avoided the conflicts that have so often torn society asunder, and managed to maintain, as a rule, some kind of equilibrium" -- J. Nehru

Historians of Religions attest to the fact that Hinduism's "capacity for toleration contributed to the characteristic resiliency and helped to assure its survival" (A.L. Basham). Among the world's religions, it the only religion which does not make the claim that it alone is the true religion, and the Hindu attitude to other religions Is "one of positive fellowship, not negative tolerance." (S. Radhakrishnan). Hinduism's positive fellowship with other religions is attested by the fact that as early as the 1st century A.D. two races of Jews, White and Black, who fled the persecution of the Romans came to Southwest India where the Hindu princes gave them charters assuring them of freedom of worship. In 52 A.D. when the Apostle Thomas came to India, the King of Cranganore conferred on him and his convert Christians full freedom of worship and all the privileges of the Brahmins. It is also interesting to note that the first Christian Church in Trivancore was built by generous grants from the Hindu King. In the eighth century likewise, the Zoroastrians (popularly known as "Parsis") who fled to India to escape the Persian persecution took refuge in India, and through the generous gifts of a Hindu prince built their first Fire Temple. Hindu attitudes to Islam was equally one of tolerance, and the Hindus have permitted the Muslims to build mosques and to practice their faith. Abdul Razak, an Ambassador from Persia and a Historian, about the middle of the fifteenth century wrote: "the people of Calicut are infidels; consequently I consider myself in an enemy's country, as the Muhammadans consider every one who has not received the Quran. Yet I admit that I meet with perfect toleration, and even favour; we have two mosques and are allowed to pray in public."

Hinduism is not only tolerant towards other religions, but is also tolerant internally within Hinduism. Hindu history does not record any Inquisitions within, and no "heretics" were sent to the torturer's rack in India. In fact, Hinduism does not have a term for "infidel". As Dr. Radhakrishnan says, "Heresy hunting, the favourite game of many religions, is singularly absent in Hinduism" For example, the very existence of divergent Hindu philosophical systems (darsanas) ranging from the "heretical" school of Carvakas to the Absolutism of Advaita Vedantins including the "athetisic" schools of Mimamsa and Samkhya is evidence for maximal tolerance within Hinduism. After "defeating" several religious sects within Hinduism, Sankaracharya, the greatest Hindu philosopher of 8th century, has re-established six of them, hence he is known as "sanmathasthapanacarya" Appayya Dikshita, a famous Vedantic philosopher in the 16th century says: "I do not find any difference in essence between Siva and Vishnu. Yet my devotion is given to Siva".

The reason tolerance is exhibited maximally in Hinduism because **Hinduism is an "experiential religion**", not a "belief religion." In belief religions what one believes is the most important. Atheists and agnostics are persecuted by the belief religions because they do not hold the correct beliefs as dictated by the religious authorities. In an experiential religion like Hinduism, it is more important is what one becomes and experiences....what one believes is less important.

Hinduism as an experiential religion recognizes that each individual's experience of Truth is different. Because individuals experience Truth differently does not mean, Truth itself is relative. Rg. Veda, therefore, says "**Truth is One**, the Wise call it by many Names" (*ekam sat viprah Bahudha vadanti*).

Second, the highest conception of God as conceived in Hinduism is "**BRAHMAN"** or "**The Absolute**." In several Upanishads, the **indescribability and incomprehensibility** of Brahman is narrated. Brahman, it is said, can only be described as "what it is not, "not this, "not this" (*neti-vada*). If such is the conception of Absolute God, disputes concerning who has the right conception of God are untenable. Tolerance of other points of view therefore becomes a necessary feature.

Third, Hinduism also breathes an air of tolerance in matters of worship in its encounters with other religions. In the Bhagavad Gita, Sri Krishna says: "Even those who are devoted to other deities and worship them, filled with faith, they too really worship Me....For I am both the recipient and the lord of all worship."

JANAMASHTMI

A Celebration Of the Birth Of Lord Krishna, the 7th Avatar of Lord Vishnu

Janamashtmi, or the birth anniversary of Lord Krishna -- the seventh avatar of Lord Vishnu. It falls on the eighth day of the waning moon in the month of Shravan in August/ September. Lord Krishna is believed to have been born at midnight on this day. The day is marked by fasting, feasting, ras lila and singing hymns.

Lord Krishna is one of the most loved and adored Gods of Hindu religion. His Childhood / Bal Leela depicts various episodes between the period of his birth till the age of ten. Lord Krishna right from the time of his birth displayed the signs of his divine being.

As the legend goes, Lord Krishna was born on a stormy night in Mathura in a prison cell. In order to save infant Krishna from his cruel uncle, the parents exchange their kid with the daughter of Yashooda and Nanda, the cowherd lord.

In most homes and temples the idol of infant Krishna is bathed at midnight and is placed in a cradle. This spectacle is called Jhanki. The cradle is rocked in an attempt to relive the time Lord Krishna was born ammidst chanting of prayers, hymns and blowing of conch shells. Krishna's childhood are recreated especially the scenes of stealing butter and curds from earthenware pots by Krishna. Pots or matkas are suspended high above the ground and young men and children form human pyramids to try and reach these pots and eventually break them. Killing Kamsa, then Putna, taming the serpent Kalia, holding up Mountain Goverdhan to the battle of Mahabharata are all fascinating. But the greatest gift to humanity is the Bhagwat Gita or The Divine Song delivered by Lord Krishna to Arjuna before the start of the battle between the Pandavas and Kauravas .

<u>SHRADDHA</u>

ANCESTOR WORSHIP through *Shraddh* is ancient. The belief in rebirth based on deeds and transmigration, though later, yet have recognized the importance of Shraddh, as existent in ancient times. Shraddh ceremony is highly auspicious. By this one remembers his ancestors, who were so dear to him.

It may be difficult to set individual dates for each person to be so honoured. Hence on Amavas, the last day of the Shraadhs, or on the Tith of the most revered member of the family, the ceremony can be done at one time for all departed souls. Even if one has forgotten to do it on the actual Tith, or one does not remember the Tith, then again on Amavas, the ceremony can be performed.

This year Shraddha begin on 23rd September and end on 7th October.

If , however, there is no way of conducting the ceremony, then one can send to the *mandir*, or to any pandit, what is called *seedha*, i.e., uncooked food like potatoes, green vegetables, white radish, curd, lemon, ginger, wheat *atta* along with oil, *mithai* and money. This can be done for every one individually on their Tith. In case one desires to do it all at once, then, again, on Amavas the *seedha* can be given.

Finally, one should remember that in societies all over the world, there are always ways and means and occasions to honour the dead in some manner or the other. Do not make this a sad occasion, but a soul-cleansing one and a day of remembrance for the whole family. Sisters and brothers are invited along with their families on such a day. However, no money is given to sisters.

HINDUISM AND TOLERANCE

Fourth, the so-called polytheistic gods in Hinduism have helped Hinduism to breathe an air tolerance. These days when religious conversion is taking place in India on a large scale, I asked several villagers why they are going to the village church and they told me that going to the church and praying to Jesus or Mary is like going to their village goddess and praying there and they do not see much difference.

(If the village pastor comes to know this, he will be dismayed and puzzles, for the pastors told by their higher-ups to preach the illiterate villagers that the Church they go to is the truth church and everything else they must discard). The villagers did not feel the conflict in worshipping both in their village goddess temple and in the church.Dr. Radhakrishnan said somewhere: "If the fair name of Greece is not stained by any religious wars, it was due to its polytheism. The Greeks do not insist that if we call Zeus by some other name, we will suffer eternal perdition."

Fifth, problems of intolerance arise with organized religions. Hinduism being a non-organized religion, there being no Hindu Popes or Hindu Ayatollahas dictating how believers ought to conduct themselves, the attitude of the Hindus among themselves and towards others is one of "live and let live."

Last but not least, in discussions on tolerance the question is raised whether the attitude of tolerance should extend even to those who are intolerant? Space limitations prevent me from discussing this problem in detail. The answer to this problem is briefly this: LOGICALLY, an attitude of tolerance implies tolerance even of those who are intolerant, but practically speaking tolerating the intolerant is foolish martyrdom which is not a virtue. It is like Communists contesting elections in a democracy with the platform that if the communists are ELECTED, there will be no more elections, and no more democracy!

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
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
